Significance of the Observance of Shrove Tuesday

The day before Ash Wednesday is called "Shrove Tuesday". It is the last day of the Ordinary Time I (before Lent). The word "shrove" is a form of the English work 'shrive', which means to obtain absolution of one's sins by the way of Confession and doing penance.

Thus Shrove Tuesday was named after the custom of Christians to be "shriven" before Leng.

Burning of Palms

This is the proper day to burh the old palms used in last year's Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion to be turned to ashes to be used tomorrow, on Ash Wednesday, the start of the Lenten Season.

Other Tradition

In other countries, Shrove Tuesday is called "Pancake Day" or "Pancake Tuesday". Shrove Tuesday was the last opportunity to use up eggs and fats before embarking on the Lenton fast and pancakes are the perfect way of using up these ingredients which are often not consumed in the Season of Lent.



Rector Reflection

From the Rector's Desk

This year, the Vestry advised me that my annual focus is to be on education. I received positive feedback for the Instructed Eucharists I held in late January. With that educating focus in mind, I thought I would reveal details around a ministry source that people may not know about.

Every Episcopal Church has a Rector's Discretionary Fund. The purpose of this fund is for the rector to help engage in outside of the box ministry opportunities. For instance, while at Christ Church, I have used the fund to buy gasoline for an individual in need, newly sober who had a new job, but not enough money to fill up the tank before the first paycheck came in. That request came by phone, we met at a local station, and I filled up the car, encouraged and prayed for the person. Another time, at an establishment that I frequent, the owner, who knows what I do for a living, asked if our parish had a clothes closet. She informed me that a homeless individual, who she lets use her business's restroom facilities, recently had his coat stolen. As this was a time where the temperature was going down, and us not having such a supply of clothing, I offered to buy a winter coat and bring it the next day. Through the Rector's Discretionary Fund, I purchased a heavy winter coat which was given to the individual in need.

Sometimes the support for the needy is not as hands on. At least once per year I receive a phone call from someone whose heat is getting turned off due to inability to pay bills. After receiving the requisite information from them, I phone the utility company and pay, at least part of, the debt. Of course, the fund can also help parishioners. Even for something like a parish dinner that costs, if there is a financial hard-ship keeping you away, I am willing to help supply what is needed, so that the parishioner can attend. Because of the pastoral nature of a Rector's Discretionary Fund, I will report the use to the Treasurer and Vestry but never identify the individual who received the assistance.

The Rector's Discretionary Fund is a precious ministry, and the Episcopal Church rules help to make sure that it is not misused. The use of the money must be for "pious and charitable purposes," and not benefit the rector who has sole discretion on how the funds are used. Additionally the rules offer the opportunity for there to always be an income stream into the reserve. For this year the Vestry chose the option, where our Treasurer makes an estimate of one Sunday's worth of Open Plate giving (non-pledged, non-otherwise restricted) and places that estimated amount into the Fund.

Finally, a person can also donate directly to it. A check made out to Christ Church, with "Rector's Discretionary Fund" in the memo line, or cash in an envelope marked as the same will add to the fund (and is tax deductible. If ever you want to direct your financial thanksgiving to something church related, making a gift to The Rector's Discretionary Fund is an acceptable option.

So, now you know. With appropriate transparency, and sharing the guidelines, and some examples, I pray that you see that I take the use of this source of financial assistance seriously. I am grateful for the ability that The Rector's Discretionary Fund provides for me to serve those in all sorts of needs. If you ever need the help, please let me know. I see the distribution of the funds, and the conversations around them as a special privilege. I am delighted to be entrusted with helping people in this manner, and blessed are those who support these pious and charitable efforts.


