THE WAY OF LOVE Practices for Jesus-Centered Life

TURN

Pause, listen, and choose to follow Jesus

As Jesus was walking along, he saw Levi son of Alphaeus sitting at the tax booth, and he said to him "Follow me." And he got up and followed him. – Mark 2:14

Like the disciples, we are called by Jesus to follow the Way of Love. With God's help, we can turn from the powers of sin, hatred, fear, injustice, and oppression toward the way of truth, love, hope, justice, and freedom. In turning, we reorient our lives to Jesus Christ, falling in love again, again, and again.

LEARN

Reflect on Scripture each day, especially on Jesus' life and teachings.

"Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them." – John 14:23

By reading and reflecting on Scripture, especially the life and teachings of Jesus, we draw near to God and God's word dwells in us. When we open our minds and hearts to Scripture, we learn to see God's story and God's activity in everyday life.

PRAY

Dwell intentionally with God each day

He was praying in a certain place, and after he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples." – Luke 11:1

Jesus teaches us to come before God with humble hearts, boldly offering our thanksgivings and concerns to God or simply listening for God's voice in our lives and in the world. Whether in thought, word or deed, individually or corporately, when we pray we invite and dwell in God's loving presence.

WORSHIP

Gather in community weekly to thank, praise, and dwell with God

When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him. - Luke 24:30-3 la

When we worship, we gather with others before God. We hear the Good News of Jesus Christ, give thanks, confess, and offer the brokenness of the world to God. As we break bread, our eyes are opened to the presence of Christ. By the power of the Holy Spirit, we are made one body, the body of Christ sent forth to live the Way of Love.

BLESS: Share faith and unselfishly give and serve

Freely you have received; freely give. – Matthew 10:8

Jesus called his disciples to give, forgive, teach, and heal in his name. We are empowered by the Spirit to bless everyone we meet, practicing generosity and compassion, and proclaiming the Good News of God in Christ with hopeful words and selfless actions. We can share our stories of blessing and invite others to the Way of Love.

GO: Cross boundaries, listen deeply and live like Jesus

Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." - John 20:21

As Jesus went to the highways and byways, he sends us beyond our circles and comfort, to witness to the love, justice, and truth of God with our lips and with our lives. We go to listen with humility and to join God in healing a hurting world. We go to become Beloved Community, a people reconciled in love with God and one another.

REST: Receive the gift of God's grace, peace, and restoration

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid. – John 14:27

From the beginning of creation, God has established the sacred pattern of going and returning, labor and rest. Especially today, God invites us to dedicate time for restoration and wholeness - within our bodies, minds, and souls, and within our communities and institutions. By resting we place our trust in God, the primary actor who brings all things to their fullness.

FOR DISCERNMENT AND REFLECTION

You, your ministry group or church or organization might begin by reflecting on the questions:

- What are the ways God is calling me to regularly engage in this practice?
- How could or how do I incorporate this practice into my life regularly?
- With whom do I need to journey in order to keep a commitment to this practice?

Daily Devotions for The Way of Love Week Two: TURN

Take 10 minutes and sit in a comfortable chair. Breathe in and exhale deeply, paying attention to the motion of your breath. Allow yourself to imagine God's presence surrounding you as you pray. Read slowly the passage below, several times. As you rise from your time of prayer, know that Jesus remains with you always.

MONDAY, October 1, 2018

Exodus 3:1-4

There the angel of the Lord appeared to Moses in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. Then Moses said, 'I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up.' When the Lord saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, 'Moses, Moses!'

Can you think of a time when God called you to turn away from a daily thought, routine or relationship?

Prayer: Loving God, help me to have eyes to see your presence and your purposes in my daily life.

TUESDAY, October 2, 2018

Psalm 119: 175-176

Let me live that I may praise you, and let your ordinances help me. I have gone astray like a lost sheep; seek out your servant, for I do not forget your commandments.

Where are the places or relationships in your daily life where you feel lost?

Prayer: Gracious God, thank you that you seek me out in my daily life. Help me to remember your love and your commandments.

WEDNESDAY, October 3, 2018

2 Corinthians 4:6

For it is the God who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

Where are areas in your life or in the lives of those around you where you see God shining light in darkness?

Prayer: Loving God, thank you that you bring the light of your peace and love into all life. Help me to seek your light in the silence of my days, in the scriptures and in the sacraments of my faith.

THURSDAY, October 4, 2018

2 Corinthians 4:7

But we have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us.

Where have you seen the power of God – in your life or in others – working in ways humans do not or cannot?

Prayer: Creator God, thank you for the treasure of your love and your power. Help me to trust you to transform my life in ways I cannot on my own.

FRIDAY, October 5, 2018

Luke 5:4-6

When Jesus had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break.

In what areas of your life or relationships do you feel like you are working "all night long but have caught nothing?"

Prayer: Merciful God, help me to listen to your Word in scriptures and in sacraments and to follow your call to try and to dare new directions for my choices and my habits.

Two Diocesan Hunger Walks Scheduled for Sunday, October 14, 2018

The Hunger Fund Committee of the Diocese of Washington cordially invites you and your congregation to attend one of the two Diocesan Hunger Walks scheduled for this October 14, 2018.

Southern Maryland Walk – starting at 1:30

This Walk is hosted by the Robinson family at their Serenity Farm (serenityfarminc.com) on the Patuxent River in Benedict, Maryland. The Walk is sponsored by the friends of Christ Church, Port Tobacco and Christ Church, Old Durham and will start at 1:30 on that Sunday afternoon.

The last few Southern Maryland Walks have been held at Serenity Farm and their facilities have been a big hit. The farm is designated as a Historic Site and is included on the National Park Service's Star Spangled Banner Trail and John Smith Chesapeake Water Trail. Activities at the farm include a petting zoo and hayride as well as the Walk itself.

Cathedral Walk – starting at 2:00

The metro area walk will be held on the Cathedral grounds, same place as lasts year. This walk through the grounds of the Cathedral promises to be an inspiration in itself. In addition, there will be representatives from some of the organizations that receive support from the Hunger Fund. Hear directly from the people who turn your funds into meals for the hungry in our Diocese.

This walk will end just as the Sunday Choral Evensong begins at 4:00 in the Cathedral. What better way to rest up from the Walk?

September 30, 2018 Feast of St. Francis of Assisi

On October 4, the Church celebrates the life and witness of St. Francis of Assisi, founder of the Franciscan and Clarissine Orders, advocate for the poor, and friend of the animals.

Born in the late 12th century, Francis was the son of a wealthy merchant and his high-born wife. Despite living a life of general comfort and ease, he found himself called toward a life in pursuit of "Lady Poverty". After a series of humbling interactions with the poor, Francis devoted himself to the care of the sick and poor, giving up his business interests and material possessions (much to his father's chagrin). It could not have been easy, but Francis' faith demanded that he trade in his fine clothes for sackcloth and financial security for scarcity. In the words of the prayer attributed to the saint, he found that "it is in giving that we receive."

Francis founded the Order of Friars Minor, which demanded a strict vow of poverty, in the belief that worldly goods too often proved distractions from a sanctified life. With Clare of Assisi, he would form the Poor Clares, a religious order for women similarly dedicated to service. A Third Order would follow close behind, for those men and women who would live out Franciscan values in the context of everyday life. In Francis' thought, to fully embrace one's poverty was to embrace reliance on God alone; to physically suffer was to identify with Christ's own suffering. According to *A Great Cloud of Witnesses*, this made Francis, "the most popular and admired [saint], but probably the least imitated."

We may perhaps remember St. Francis best for his devotion to nature and animals; in several hagiographies, or stories of the saints, Francis is depicted as preaching to and otherwise communicating with fish, birds, and even a wolf. He believed that the Creator is praised through all his creatures and, indeed, creation itself. It is in this spirit that many Episcopal churches offer blessings of pets and other animals each year on Francis' feast day.

Collect for the Feast of St. Francis

Most high, omnipotent, good Lord, grant your people grace to renounce gladly the vanities of this world; that, following the way of blessed Francis, we may for love of you delight in your whole creation with perfectness of joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.


