# Episcopal Church Core Beliefs and Doctrines

### Baptismal Covenant

*"Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil and renew your commitment to Jesus Christ?"* (Book of Common Prayer, p. 292).

A mini catechism used at baptisms and on Easter and other special occasions, the Baptismal Covenant opens with a question-and-answer version of the statement of faith that is the Apostles' Creed and adds five questions regarding how we, as Christians, are called to live out our faith.

### The Bible

*"Blessed Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them"* (Book of Common Prayer, p. 236).

It is our foundation, understood through tradition and reason, containing all things necessary for salvation. Our worship is filled with Scripture from beginning to end. Approximately 70% of the Book of Common Prayer comes directly from the Bible, and Episcopalians read more Holy Scripture in Sunday worship than almost any other denomination in Christianity. (See [Revised Common Lectionary](#) of readings.)

### Book of Common Prayer

*"It is a most invaluable part of that blessed 'liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free,' that in his worship different forms and usages may without offence be allowed, provided the substance of the Faith be kept entire"* (Book of Common Prayer, p. 9).

The Book of Common Prayer is a treasure chest full of devotional and teaching resources for individuals and congregations, but it is also the primary symbol of our unity. We, who are many and diverse, come together in Christ through our worship, our common prayer.

### The Catechism

*"It is a commentary on the creeds, but is not meant to be a complete statement of belief and practices; rather, it is a point of departure for the teacher"* (Book of Common Prayer, p. 844). Offered in a question-and-answer format, the Catechism found in the back of the [Book of Common Prayer](#) (pp. 845-862) helps teach the foundational truths of the Christian faith.



## Episcopal 101: A Deeper Understanding of Our Church

### The Creeds

*"The Creeds are statements of our basic beliefs about God"* (Book of Common Prayer, p. 851).

We will always have questions, but in the two foundational statements of faith – the Apostles' Creed used at baptism, and the Nicene Creed used at communion – we join Christians throughout the ages in affirming our faith in the one God who created us, redeemed us, and sanctifies us.

### Holy Baptism

*"Holy Baptism is full initiation by water and the Holy Spirit into Christ's Body, the Church"* (Book of Common Prayer, p. 298).

In the waters of baptism we are reminded that we belong to God and nothing can separate us from the love of God. We also find ourselves part of an extended family, one with Christians throughout the ages and across the world, what we call the "one, holy, catholic [meaning 'universal'], and apostolic Church." The Rite of Holy Baptism can be found on pp. 297-308 of the Book of Common Prayer.

### Holy Communion

*"We thank you ... for assuring us in these holy mysteries that we are living members of the Body of your Son, and heirs of your eternal kingdom"* (Book of Common Prayer, p. 366).

It goes by several names: Holy Communion, the Eucharist (which literally means "thanksgiving"), mass. But whatever it's called, this is the family meal for Christians and a foretaste of the heavenly banquet. As such, all persons who have been baptized, and are therefore part of the extended family that is the Church, are welcome to receive the bread and wine, and be in communion with God and each other.

### The Sacraments

*"Sacraments are outward and visible signs of inward and spiritual grace"* (Book of Common Prayer, p. 857). Besides baptism and the Eucharist (Holy Communion), the church recognizes other spiritual markers in our journey of faith. These include:

- Confirmation (the adult affirmation of our baptismal vows), pp. 413-419, Book of Common Prayer
- Reconciliation of a Penitent (private confession), pp. 447-452, Book of Common Prayer
- Matrimony (Christian marriage), pp. 422-438, Book of Common Prayer
- Orders (ordination to deacon, priest, or bishop), pp. 510-555, Book of Common Prayer
- Unction (anointing with oil those who are sick or dying) pp. 453-467, Book of Common Prayer

These help us to be a sacramental people, seeing God always at work around us.

### **The Feast of St. Mary the Virgin**

On August 15, the church celebrates the Feast of Saint Mary the Virgin. Mary, the mother of Christ, has been celebrated since the earliest days of the Christian church.

The Gospel of Luke contains a “Song of Praise” that was sung by Mary when her cousin Elizabeth recognized her as the mother of the Lord (Luke 1:43). Elizabeth was pregnant with John the Baptist when her cousin Mary, who was pregnant with Jesus, came to see her:

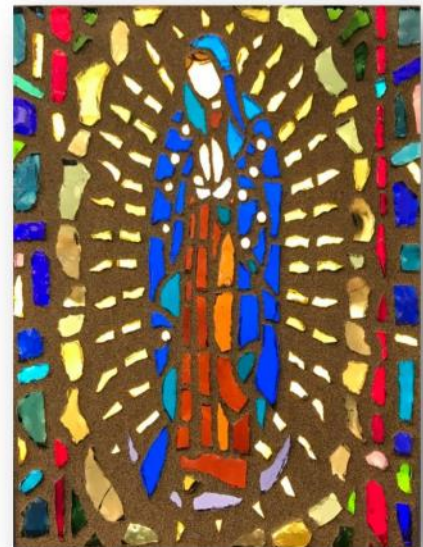
“When Elizabeth heard Mary’s greeting, the child leapt in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, ‘Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leapt for joy’” (Luke 1:41-44).

“Mary’s Song of Praise” is also called “The Magnificat” because its opening line in Latin is: “Magnificat anima mea Dominum,” “My soul magnifies the Lord.”

#### *Mary’s Song of Praise (The Magnificat)*

My soul magnifies the Lord,  
and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior,  
for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant.  
Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed;  
for the Mighty One has done great things for me,  
and holy is his name.  
His mercy is for those who fear him  
from generation to generation.  
He has shown strength with his arm;  
he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts.  
He has brought down the powerful from their thrones,  
and lifted up the lowly;  
he has filled the hungry with good things,  
and sent the rich away empty.  
He has helped his servant Israel,  
in remembrance of his mercy,  
according to the promise he made to our ancestors,  
to Abraham and to his descendants for ever.

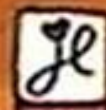

### Colton Kirchner

Colton is a sixth grader at LMS. He was diagnosed a few weeks after his 7<sup>th</sup> birthday with B-cell ALL (Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia) following a yearly well check. He was in and out of the hospital for the first 11 months of the treatment cycle. Colton's original treatment plan lasted a total of 3 ½ years. Treatment was going great. He was playing baseball and keeping up good grades at school. In February 2017, his family received a call from Colton's oncologist stating there were leukemia cells found in Colton's spinal fluid. Six months later, his relapse was official. Even though they had months to pray and prepare, this was devastating news. Colton was in the hospital for five weeks straight after this diagnosis. His treatment consisted of many nights at Children's Hospital. He was able to come home for Christmas. They finally got a break and were able to enjoy some family time. Colton's current treatment plan will last two years, ending October 2019. He is currently in the maintenance phase that will include radiation for two weeks in August.

Noah is a 15 year old LHS sophomore. On June 16th 2017, Noah was diagnosed with ALL. Noah spent the remainder of June and the month of July 2017 at Children's National Medical Center. Noah continued intensive chemotherapy treatments; he spent several weeks as an inpatient at Children's and traveled there every Friday to receive chemotherapy treatments, tests, and spinal taps. Due to the effects of his treatments, Noah was only able to attend school 23 out of 180 days of his freshman year. In May of 2018,

Noah entered the maintenance phase of his treatment which entails daily chemotherapy, steroids, and monthly visits to Children's for tests, chemotherapy infusions, and spinal taps for the next three years. Through the assistance of his teachers and Home Hospital teacher, in June Noah was able to complete all of his honors classes with straight As. If all goes well and as planned, Noah will complete his treatments in May of 2020; just in time to graduate from LHS. Noah is a wonderful, caring, smart, and extremely compassionate 15-year-old. He enjoys playing sports, paintball, video games, boating, fishing, crabbing, learning to drive, listening to music, and spending time with his friends & family. Despite his diagnosis and the negative effects of his treatments, Noah continues to try to be positive, focusing on the end goal of being cured of cancer. His strength and resiliency as he goes through this difficult time has been inspirational and is a testament to what a wonderful person he is.

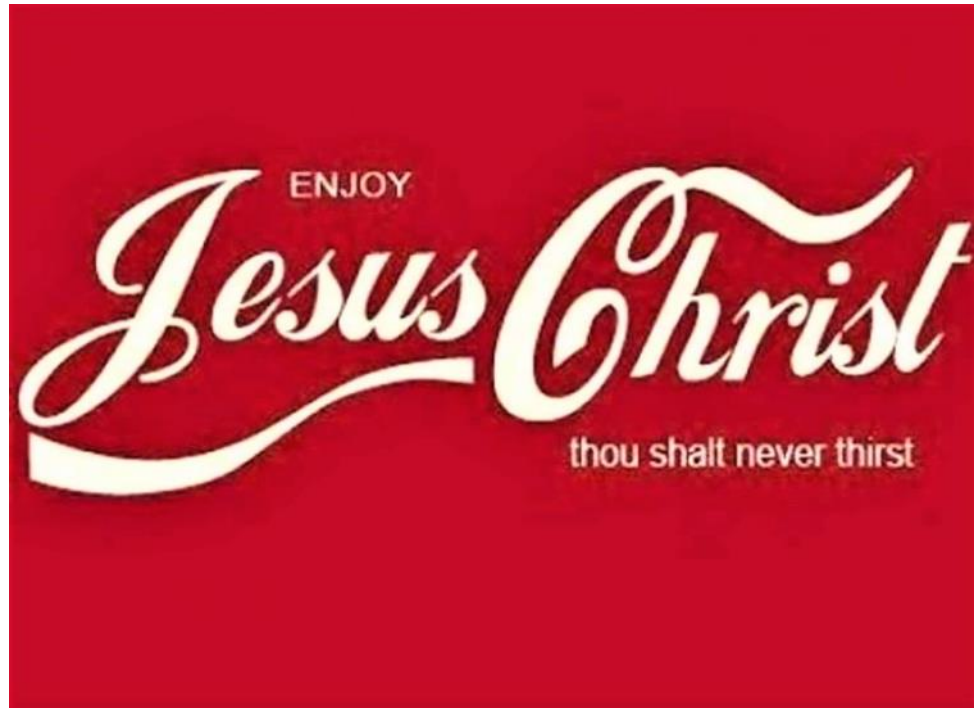

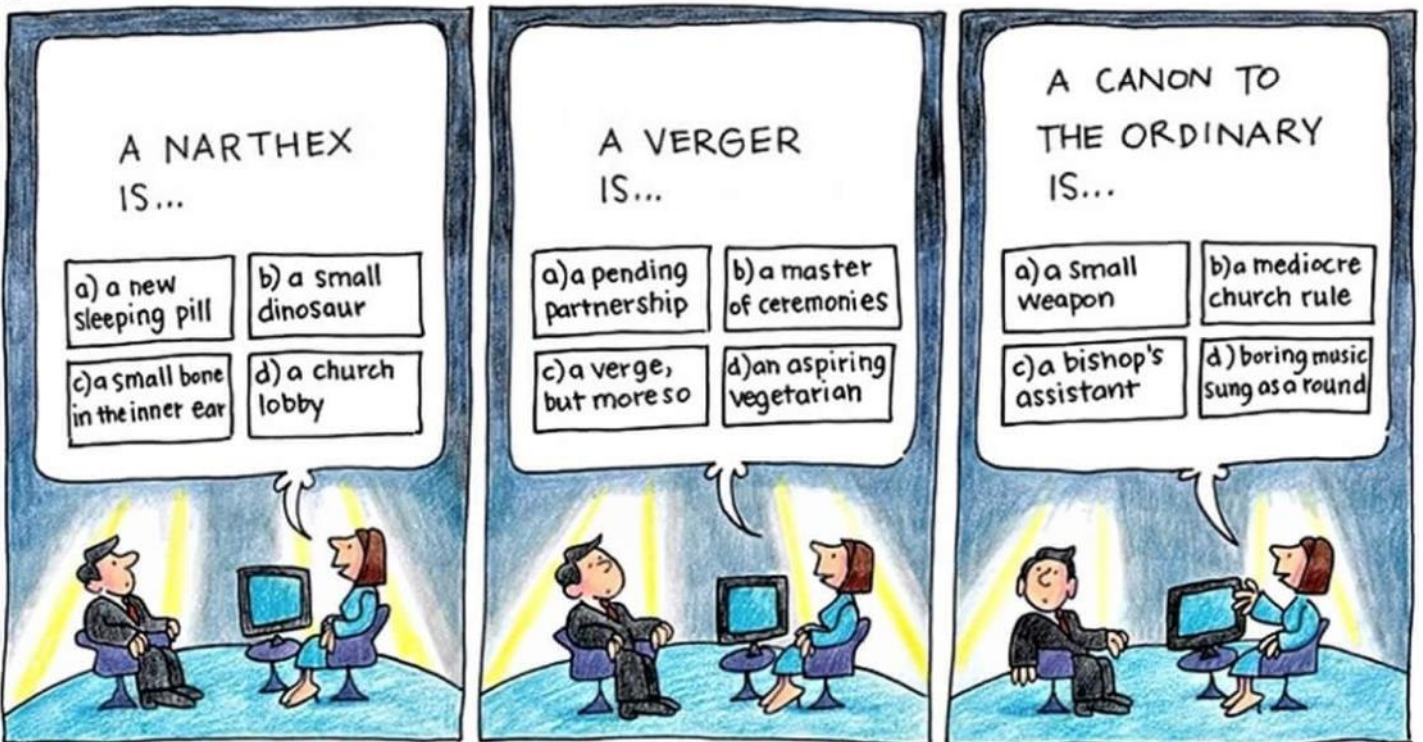
