RECUMBENT TANDEM TRIKE PROGRAM by Dan Donahue

I have developed a faith mission based on my understanding of Jesus that blends Episcopal values and beliefs with my own interests and abilities in the fields of recumbent cycling and volunteering. After hearing this presentation, if you're interested or know of a family member or friend who might benefit from the program, contact me or Fr. Chris as a point of contact.

The purpose of this program is to provide an opportunity for impaired adults to ride as a stoker (rear seat peddler on a two-person bike) aboard a recumbent tandem trike. Adult participants will come from the following categories: Either be disabled, chronically ill, injured or older veteran, the blind, terminally ill, or those impaired in other ways by age.

Rides will occur on either the Three Notch Trail or the Indian Head Rail Trail. Since the bike is a three wheeler, stokers will not need to have strong balancing skills. Back seaters need not have the physical ability to pedal constantly. Occasional pedaling, or not pedaling at all, are acceptable. The only requirements are that the stoker have medical clearance and not be at risk of falling off the rear seat.

My cycling club, Oxon Hill Bike and Trail Club, sponsors the program, while Lynn and Chip Burton provide the tandem trike on a loan basis. Since my cycling club sponsors the program, riders must comply with club rules and standards. Every rider must wear a bike helmet. In addition, insurance rules require that participants join the club after their first ride. Annual membership is \$15 for individuals and \$35 for families. Major advantages of this arrangement with my cycling club include insurance coverage, potential recruitment pool for additional tandem captains (front seat steering and braking rider), and volunteer maintenance and repair of the trike.



REFLECTIONS ON THIS SUNDAY'S READINGS (Sept. 29, 2019) The Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost—Proper 21, Year C

Welcome to Christ Church. We invite you to be a part of our celebration of Jesus Christ dying and rising in the midst of His people. In the gospel reading today, we hear his parable of Dives and Lazarus with its warning that failure to respond to the gospel in ministry to others can result in losing our place in his Kingdom. Christian living includes care for the poor, the sick and the helpless, actions fully as holy as worship and prayer.



In today's reading from Jeremiah, Judah has reached

the time of its destruction. Jeremiah is told to perform an action that reveals a seed of hope. He is to buy land and have deeds saved and preserved by his assistant, Baruch. This is a sign that even though Judah will destroyed as a nation, the time will come when it will be revived and people will return to possess the land.

Again, today, we read from the first epistle of Timothy. This book of practical advice for Christian living urges that the Christian remain faithful to Christ's commandments. Furthermore, the rich within the Christian community are to practice generosity, lest their riches become a barrier to the new life in Christ, which God has given us.

When we celebrate the Eucharist, we gather as one people regardless of our material or social standing. As disciples we respond to God's love in worship and are sent forth to embody that love of God in concrete acts of care for the poor and helpless.

September 29, 2019 – Pentecost 16 (C) Young Adult and Campus Ministry Grants

The Episcopal Church is now accepting applications for grants to assist with Young Adult and Campus Ministries throughout the church. This is a three-step process that includes discernment and planning, writing the application, and online submission. This process is designed to help communities discern where and how God is calling them to serve young adults and whether now is the right time to apply for a grant. It is also an invitation for communities to consider how The Episcopal Church can minister with young adults on and off college campuses, (including community colleges and tribal college campuses, non-traditional degree programs) in the military, and those who are not in college.

Eligibility

These grants are intended to provide funding for an Episcopal ministry (or ecumenical ministry with an Episcopal presence) in a diocese, congregation, or college/university that is currently engaging in or seeking a new relationship with young adults on and off college campuses. Other eligibility and Competitive Grant Requirements are listed on the website here: *episcopalchurch.org/youngadult/grants*.

Amount, Duration, and Categories of Grants

A total of \$133,000 is available for this cycle, with a total of \$400,000 available this triennium. These grants are for the 2020-2021 academic year. **Deadline for submitting grants is November 11, 2019**. There are four categories of grants:

- 1. Leadership Grant: to establish a new, restore a dormant, or reenergize a current campus ministry. Grant will range from \$5,000-30,000 and can be used over a two-year period. This grant can only be awarded to a specific ministry once every 5 years.
- 2. Campus Ministry Grants: to provide seed money to assist in the start-up of new, innovative campus ministries or to enhance a current ministry. Grants \$1,000-5,000.
- 3. Young Adult Ministry Grants: to provide seed money to assist in the start-up of new, innovative young adult ministries or to enhance a current ministry. Grants \$1,000-5,000.
- 4. **Project Grants:** to provide money for a one-time project that will enhance and impact the campus or young adult ministry. Grants \$100-1,000.

Discernment and Planning

Developing a grant application is best done in a community where colleagues and supporters can discern and explore where God is calling the ministry to grow, change, or do something new. Potential applicants are strongly encouraged to use the Discernment and Planning Guide that can be found here: *episcopalchurch.org/youngadult/grants*.

Grant Cycle Timeline

September – October: Gather a team to discern.

October: Write your grant if you have discerned that this is the year to apply. Get your bishop's signature! If you have questions, tune in to the Webinar.

October 14: Online grant submission opens.

November 11: Grant Applications are due by 10pm Eastern Time.

December: Grant readers consider applications received and make recommendations.

February: Recommendations sent to Executive Council for approval. Decisions announced.
